FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

"So we are always of good courage; even though we know that while we are at home in the body, we are away from the Lord – for we walk by faith, not by sight." – Il Corinthians 5:6

On two occasions in this chapter, Paul uses the term "good courage." What is "good courage?" Plato once said that courage was one of the <u>three</u> cardinal virtues. Therefore, wouldn't all courage be good? Not really.

A murderer or burglar might muster up enough nerve to commit his crime, but that is surely not "good courage." Nor is the foolhardiness of daredevils, or the violent boldness of fanatics and terrorists, or the gung-ho machismo of many of our contemporary movie or sports stars. Taking unnecessary chances with our lives or the lives of others might take a certain amount of recklessness, but one could hardly call it "good courage."

Good courage usually isn't all that dramatic. It is much less flamboyant. Good courage, as Paul expresses it, has more to do with **steadfastness**...with just "hanging in **there**," as we say. A "wise endurance," as Plato put it. A "grace under fire," as Hemingway said, in perhaps the best definition of courage ever coined.

Good courage is often simply doing your duty – doing what is expected of you -- not only for your own good, but also for the good of others. It may be heroic and brave at times, but more often than not it will be more low-profile – something that only you and possibly those close to you – may ever

notice. And God, of course. God always notices.

By adding "good" to "courage," Paul is making the moral connection that real courage arises out of strength of character. Paul Tillich, in his book The Courage to Be, says that courage is not simply a way of meeting danger, it is a way of life. We are given the opportunity to be part of the creative work of God in this world. Whenever we actively seek to live out that opportunity, instead of withdrawing from life, we are exhibiting what Tillich calls, "the courage to be a part." And it is good. But even better is the courage to be one's self. This always involves the risk of failing to be one's self. A certain strength of faith is needed to tackle that risk. And that is what Tillich calls, "the courage to be." This courage "to be" is rooted in God.

Life is filled with people who play out the hand dealt them with "good courage." You see it in parents who matter-of-factly raise handicapped children. You see it in those who live in constant pain without becoming bitter. You see it in persons who care lovingly for aging parents. There is no roll of the drums for this kind of courage, no tickertape parade, no medal of honor. It is more of a hushed heroism, a silent sacrifice, willing to steadfastly endure whatever responsibility life has placed before one. This quiet acceptance, and surrender to the leading of God, is the "good courage," of which Paul speaks.

Collectively, we strive to serve as the hands, arms, legs, voice and heart of Christ in reaching others and in sharing His love. Our featured members this issue are Martha and Bill Edwards.

In 1962, married only four years, a young couple, Bill and Martha Edwards, made two decisions that enriched the lives of a great many people: they decided to make Hohenwald their home and to make First United Methodist Church their church home.

Now, more than 50 years later, they are so much a part of the community and the church that it is difficult to imagine either the church or the town without them. Martha's

ties to First Methodist go even deeper, predating their joining the church as a couple in 1962. She has been a member of First United Methodist Church since she was in the fifth grade.

After they met in high school, Bill served in the U.S. Navy from 1953-56 before attending Austin Peay State University, where he studied chemistry and biology. After graduation, he taught at UT-Martin and Clarksville High School. Martha, a graduate of Middle Tennessee State University, worked as a bookkeeper at Genesco, then taught third grade until she retired in 1993. Married in 1958, they were living in Martin, TN, when a chance encounter in 1962 opened the doors for Bill and Martha to move back to Hohenwald. "We were in Hohenwald for a visit, and decided to visit First United Methodist Church while we were in town," Bill said. "Martha's sister Sue was with us, and the plant manager of American Biltrite (which later became Dana Corp.) asked her who we were. As it turned out, he needed a chemist at the plant, so he hired me."



Both Bill and Martha also spend time outdoors at their place on the Buffalo River.
