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FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

"The eunuch had come to Jerusalem to worship, and was returning to his home; seated in his chariot, he was reading the prophet Isaiah. Then the Spirit said to Philip, 'Go over to this chariot and join it.'" (Acts 8:28-29)

The story is told of a man who, while walking in his backyard one day, suddenly felt the ground give way. He found himself sitting at the bottom of a deep abandoned well which had been forgotten for years and covered over with vegetation. Then he began to pray: "Lord, if you'll just get me out of this hole and save me, I'll turn my life over to you!" A few moments later, someone heard his cries and rescued the man. Next Sunday, the man joined the church and became one of the most eager witnesses for Christ his town had ever seen. His approach to witnessing was a bit unusual, however. Every time he wanted to witness to someone, he would invite that person over to his house, take him or her out to the backyard, and push the person down that old well. Since that's where this man had found Christ, that's where he figured everyone else should start too!

Every Christian witness counts four obvious elements: the one being witnessed to, the one witnessing, and the content of the witness given. The fourth element is the

most important of all the factors, though not always the most apparent. **Every true**Christian witness begins at the impetus of the Holy Spirit.

I believe that a reluctant or ineffective witness usually lacks a true reliance upon this fourth element. It was the Holy Spirit which allowed Philip that day to sense that this Ethiopian eunuch was already seeking God. Philip did not have to berate the man or browbeat him with scripture. He really didn't have to convince him of anything. All he had to do was point him toward what he had already been seeking. Philip was able to meet this man on his own level, as Luke tells us: "joining him" in his chariot.

Often we who are already in the church make it much more difficult than necessary for others to enter. Many times, some well-meaning, but misguided, witness has inadvertently placed a row of stumbling blocks in other people's paths, levying requirements and expectations which go far beyond those of the Gospel to which they are witnessing.

Reliance upon and trust in the Holy Spirit allows us to sense the right time and the right place. It also gives us the right words. But perhaps most importantly, it gives us the humility necessary to meet another person where they really are. Dr. D.T., a Methodist missionary to India in this

century, said it as well as it has ever been expressed before or since: "Christian evangelism is simply one beggar telling another beggar where to find bread."


Both are now active members, with Jim serving as President of the revived United Methodist Men's group, and Joyce a faithful member of the choir.
