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FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

"One of them, a lawyer, asked him a question to test him. 'Teacher, which commandment in the law is the greatest?' Jesus said to him, 'You shall love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, and soul, and mind. This is the greatest and first commandment. And a second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself."" (Matthew 22: 35-39)

Jesus cited the command to love God as "part one" of a two-part answer to the lawyer's question. The command to <u>love</u> God is followed by the command to love neighbor. The British writer, D.H. Lawrence, wrote a moving short story entitled "The Man Who Loved Islands" about a man who hated people so much that he longed to live apart from the rest of humanity. With his savings he bought an uninhabited island. He was certain he would find fulfillment there, in total isolation. But seclusion did not bring the fulfillment he had hoped for. He became restless; he blamed it on the island. All he needed was a different island, he told himself. So he sold the first island and moved to another, then another, and another. He spent years moving from island to island in the futile search for happiness in isolation. In the end he became hopelessly insane.

It is more than possible that much of the misery in our time is the result of our love of "islands" or, put another way, the result of our disobedience to the second part of the great commandment. The command to love neighbor is the strongest possible affirmation of having been created for life in community...to know one another, to appreciate the uniqueness of one another, to share in one another's sorrows and joys, but like "the man who loved islands," we too often see others as the cause of all our problems. Of course, we don't buy islands to escape from each other...but we do create emotional pockets of isolation. We remain in relationships, but without sharing our lives on any deep level...We live superficially, and we begin to view others as a threat to our own vulnerability.

Christ invites us today to "get off our islands." Isolation breeds despair. The cure for much depression is simply to immerse oneself in community. It is in community that we best experience the love and grace of God. In fact, the <u>self</u> cannot really exist without <u>another</u> to give it meaning. To love God is really to love neighbor, and to love neighbor is really to love God. There is no greater commandment.

FEATURED MEMBER

If people were trees, **Ann Strickland** could easily qualify as a stately oak -- tall, strong, sheltering, beautiful and resilient.

Ann grew up in Michigan, where she married and started a family. When her husband developed a health problem, his doctor suggested his health would benefit by a move to a warmer climate. At age 30, with four children at that point, Ann and her family relocated to Florida. There, his health did show improvement, thanks not only to the move but also to Ann's tenacity in preparing a plan to address her husband's serious heart condition. In the meantime, they were blessed with a fifth child. However, after surviving open heart surgery in his 30s and living another eight years, her husband passed away at age 40.

Ann was on her own raising her five children for several years. And then, she attended a wedding where a charming man asked her to dance. They started meeting to go dancing and dated for five years. "All the children got along well with the others and were delighted when Ken and I decided to get married," Ann said. "They were all happy with our decision. His children loved me, and I have always been a friend to all them.



"I had always wanted a Hawaiian wedding," she said, "so I made sure our wedding would have a Hawaiian theme." To that end, Ann not only made her own wedding dress, she made Hawaiian shirts for Ken and the boys, dresses for the girls, the wedding cake and flower arrangements. Married to him for 19 happy years, their blended family included nine offspring – her five children and his four – and numerous grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

She and her late husband Ken put down roots in Hohenwald in 2002, buying property and having a home built. "My daughter Stacy and her husband have property here and invited Ken and I to come visit. We fell in love with Hohenwald. We were impressed with how friendly and helpful the people here were." When Ken passed away the year after their move, Ann remained in Hohenwald and has made her life here one of service to the community and the church.

"Over the years, there have been deaths of children and grandchildren," Ann said, "and while it is difficult, it is part of life." In particular, the passing of Ann's granddaughter Gina was "a lesson for all of us. Gina, who was born with a rare condition, was never treated as handicapped. She was loving and was very much loved by her family and her many friends. She touched a lot of lives. There were 500 people at her funeral, including not only family and friends but also the doctors, nurses and medical scientists who had gotten to know her."

Over the past 14 years, Ann, too, has touched a lot of lives in Hohenwald. In addition to singing alto in the choir, she has been active in heading and serving on the church's Witness Committee, helping to produce the Prayer Shawl brochures, maintaining the Usher list and bulletin boards, serving as a counter of tithes and offerings, and producing the Church

Directory. She also is active with the Lewis County Public Library, serving on its Board and the Friends of the Library, and has been very involved in making the library more user-friendly.



Another group Ann is involved with is the Red Hat Society. Ann is a member of two Red Hat groups - the Glitzy Adorable Dames and the Glitzy Manor Dames. The latter group, the Glitzy Manor Dames, works with the Lewis County Manor nursing home to visit regularly with residents, serving them coffee, playing games with them and remembering them with little gifts for birthdays and special occasions. Known for their cheerful spirits, purple dresses and red hats, The Red Hat Society is an international organization designed to help women form lasting friendships, support and encourage each other and to help others in a spirit of fun. Ann is a charter member of the Glitzy Adorable Dames.

Like the stately oak, Ann Strickland's branches reach far and wide, sheltering, nurturing and protecting many throughout her life.
