## FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

"And a voice came from heaven, 'You are my Son, the Beloved, with you I am well-pleased.' And the Spirit immediately drove him out of the wilderness." (Mark 1: 11-12)

The spiritual life is like an ocean. To be chosen by God is to ride one crest of the wave to the next... and in between are moments, even days, of uncertainty and fear. So don't feel bad when you find yourself tempted on every side. Even Jesus was tempted immediately following his baptism. According to Mark, temptation is a natural consequence of deep spiritual experience. And the way to overcome temptation is to remember our baptism.

Because of the unbelievably rapid changes in Eastern Europe recently, it is easy for us to forget the oppression and the hopelessness there in the years following World War II. Robert McAfee Grown tells of a day in 1960 when he participated in a Lutheran worship service in East Berlin, only a short time before the Berlin Wall was built. There were not many people present, because at that time church attendance was viewed with suspicion by the state. The East German Republic had developed secular alternative to replace all the rituals of the church.

Still, a young couple was there in the services, presenting their child for baptism. Brown was amazed. Why, he wondered, would these young parents jeopardize their future and that of their child by insisting on this ancient ritual of baptism, when a secular alternative was readily and painlessly available? He wrote these words: "The couple does not have to answer my question. Their very act of bringing their baby to church is a public statement of their priorities. They engage in significant risk because of their faith. In the face of their quiet courage, I feel unworthy."

You see, this couple knew a secret about their child which no secular government could take away: this is a child of God. Temptation, for those who trust, can only affirm the story. For we also belong to God, baptized in the very name of the one of whom God said: "This is my beloved Son! In Him I am well-pleased!"

# Donations to Little Swan Hunting Club Brightened Christmas for Local Children



For the second year in a row, more than 100 local children had a Merrier Christmas, thanks to the generosity of HUMC members who donated more than \$2300 each of those years.

In 2015, \$2700 was raised by our church members, and in 2016, \$2310 was donated. In addition, we provided a Christmas meal, prepared by our members, to the children and their families. Coupled with donations from others, the Little Swan Hunting spent at least \$75 on each child, more than \$10,000 this year, enabling us to clothe each child from head to toe: shoes, socks, underwear, pants and shirts, as well a coat if needed.

Toys received by Toys for Tots were also distributed, along with toys we supplied if needed. And, we also provided food baskets to elderly shut-ins if a name was provided, and assisted flood victims with clothing.

Over the years, she has added a number of other hobbies such as camping, hunting, fishing, shooting, sports, marathon running (she runs full marathons, and plans to run in the upcoming Nashville Rock 'n' Roll marathon this summer), cooking and guilting.

While she was in college, Cora took on such non-traditional summer jobs as working in construction and working cattle on a ranch in Texas, where she worked on round-ups, branding and vaccinating cattle. "It was definitely hard, physical work, but it was also a lot of fun," she said.

And Cora uses her expertise and talents to give back to the community and to her church family here at Hohenwald United Methodist Church.



"I love the kids," she said. "You can learn a lot about them and from them when you are driving that van or playing basketball with them."

Her optimistic, can-do spirit is especially inspirational when one learns that Cora is

doing all that she does while climbing what she calls her "Daily Mountain" – a diagnosis of Lupus she received three years ago. "I won't let it interfere with my life," she said, "and I refuse to let it get me down. I am going to live life on my terms, and that's that." She has already had several surgeries and is scheduled for chemotherapy this month.

Later this year, she and her husband Kenny plan to go elk hunting in Idaho. In addition, Cora is an excellent "fisherman," enjoying all kinds of fishing – salt-flat fishing, wade fishing, fly fishing and off-shore fishing. Her fishing adventures have taken her to many spots throughout the country, such as Alaska.



Born in Napierville, IL, she grew up in Texas, where she met her husband Kenny. When they married, she became an "instant mom" to Kenny's children Sharon and Hayden. Together for 12 years and married for over 10 years, she considers both Sharon and Hayden her children and is very proud of them. "My family is my number one priority," Cora said. Sharon graduated from high school here in Hohenwald and is getting ready to graduate from the University of Houston this summer. Stepson Hayden plans to move here after high school and is planning to join the service. Her family also includes Al Capone, the pug, Snickers the cat and her mustang Bam-Bam.

Cora, who comes from a long line of Methodists, has been attending HUMC for

the last five years. One of the best things about HUMC, she says, is the "Open Hearts, Open Minds" attitude displayed by its members.
