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From the Pastor's Desk

Bible verse: "The kingdom of heaven is like a treasure hidden in a field, which someone found and hid; then in his joy he goes and sells all that he has and buys that field."

(Matthew 13: 44)

Some people absolutely love surprises! These folks wouldn't dream of trying to find out where the gifts are hidden, and they certainly wouldn't shake a present before opening it to try and guess the contents. People who like surprises read mystery novels, buy anything that advertises: **"Free Surprise Gift Inside,"** and believe a birthday hasn't been properly celebrated unless a surprise party has been planned and executed.

Other people absolutely hate surprises. They need to know the when, the where, the how, the what, and, if possible, the why of everything that happens. They would not think of simply hopping into a car and letting a map take them on vacation without knowing in advance exactly what they are going to see and do. They write giftsuggestion lists for their families and friends, and tend to exchange the things they received but didn't ask for. They often read the end of the book before the middle, and are uncomfortable in any ambiguous situations.

In the parables of Jesus, the spirit of God is seen as being continually unleashed, continually providing opportunities and instances in time's fullness to sense God's presence and God's grace, often when and where we least expect it. In fact, there is a sense in which God's grace <u>must</u> be a surprise. When we begin to expect it, it is no longer grace.

Do you ever feel the need, as I feel the need, to be drawn by purposes beyond the range of my own ego needs . . . to simply rest in a blind trust that God, and not me, knows what I best need at any given moment?

A boat pilot who skillfully guided his craft into a difficult port was once praised by an observer: "You know where all the shallow places are, and you avoid them so well!" The pilot replied, "You are wrong about that. All I know is where the deep waters are to be found." It is easy to know the shallow places of life. We spend most of our time there. But God often calls us to the deeper waters, waters that are quiet, and sustaining, and unknowable . . . far beyond the ripples of the shallows.

The amazing worth of the kingdom of God, given root and substance through Christ our Lord, provides for us the courage and the trust to live our lives not knowing, or even wanting to know, all the answers—but instead simply seeking, believing, responding—surprised by joy. According to Jesus, it is only in this attitude that our peace of mind can at last be found!

Business Highlights—2017 Annual Conference



Cabinet Resolution

1. Redistricting Resolution

Consolidating seven districts to five, each after a river: Caney Fork River; Red River; Stone River; and Harpeth River. We are in the Harpeth River District.

2. Charge Line Changes

Example: The Bethel UMC be removed from the Lobelville/Bethel/Warren charge and joined with Chappell Memorial to

become the Chappell Memorial/Bethel Charge, etc.

3. Resolutions for Discontinuance

Nine church closures and one merger

Closures: Mt Zion (Columbia District); Pleasant Grove (Sumner County); Paran UMC (Cookville District); Salem UMC (Cookville District); Pleasant Ridge (Cookville District); Lost Creek UMC, Ernest Newman UMC (Davidson County); 61st Ave UMC (Davidson County); Bonnertown UMC (Wayne County)

Merger: East End UMC with Coleman (Lawrence County).

Constitutional Amendments

- Amendment 1—updated Book of Discipline to recognize that women and men are equal. Present constitution addresses racial justice but not gender justice.
- Amendment 2—Nor shall any member be denied access to an equal life, worship, and governance of the church because of race, color, gender, natural origin, ability, age, martial status, or economic condition.
- Amendment 3—General Conference delegator shall be elected by the body of annual conference.
- Amendment 4—Episcopal elections in central conference shall be held at regular, not an extra session of the central conference.
- Amendment 5—The Jurisdictional Conference shall elect a standing committee on episcopacy to review the work of the Bishop ect.

All of these amendments were adopted at the General Conference in Portland, May 2016, but needed approval at each annual conference. Each amendment basically involved housekeeping and updating of the Book of Discipline.

Junior/Senior Sunday School Class News

The Junior/Senior Sunday School Class continues to study the story of King David as portrayed in the book: *DAVID* by Beth Moore. We spent fully half the book in a lead up to the time when David actually became king, as his first 15 or more years after being anointed king by the prophet Samuel, David spent largely in hiding from King Saul who wanted to kill David.

In the 42nd day of our study, Saul was finally killed by the Philistines, and David was allowed to come out of hiding and set up his seat of government in Hebron.

In day 44 David and his army attacked the city of Jerusalem and, after subduing the Jebusite inhabitants, set up David's government there. After that time, Jerusalem began to be called the City of David instead of the previous Zion or Jerusalem tags.

By the next newsletter, the class will probably have reached day 64 of our study, and the 20 intervening chapters will include the early rule of David, his conquering of the Philistines and other enemy tribes, the Bathsheba story, and the birth of most of David's children. All of these periods will be covered in great detail and include many of the chapters of the Psalms. The study is an in-depth look at the life and time of the man who is still regarded as the greatest king in all the history of the Jewish nation. Many of the enigmas surrounding his rule and the perplexing decisions made and allowed by God during David's reign will be discussed at length.
