## **Lent: The Journey Inward**

Jesus began his ministry by spending 40 days and 40 nights in the wilderness. There he fasted. When he was at his weakest, the devil tempted him. We gain clarity about who we are by resisting the temptation to become something else. Jesus solidified his commitment to obey God's voice by saying NO to the voice of God's adversary.

Lent is the Christian's 40 days and 40 nights of journeying inward. We all have evil spirits residing within us. We are tempted to give in to their determining who we will be. Lent invites us to recognize that, though they make big promises, what they always deliver is some sort of dying. The cross of Jesus shows us what happens when the evil spirits are allowed to have their way.

Lent asks us to look inside and be honest about what's there. We cannot be healed of past hurts, if we're pretending they don't exist. We cannot become whole, if we are denying that parts of ourselves are so separate from us they seem to have a will of their own and are out of control. We cannot be free to love, if we're being held captive by anger and resentment.

The Journey Inward is not one we eagerly travel. It's scary. It's exhausting. We wonder if we'll come out alive. We wonder if we'll come out the same person who went in—of course not. Thank God.

Your Church is offering several spiritual disciplines to assist you in your Journey Inward. Some will be most beneficial if you do them along with some journey companions. Be assured that all will be done with Christ, who will lead the way because he's traveled this road before.

These names are taken from the visitor cards available in the pews on Sunday mornings. Visitors are asked to put them in the collection plate. Cards and offering envelopes are replaced by member, Donna Hood, who also straightens up the cards, hymnals, and Bibles weekly.

#### **Committee on Christian Nurture**

The Committee on Christian Nurture met January 25, 2018, at the church. Brother Drew Brewer laid out the duties and purpose of the committee and welcomed new members.

Jerry Tibbs reported that the Sunday school program currently has 2 adult classes and 2 children's classes. The committee is always open to starting new classes if the need arises. Brother Drew announced the Lenten study for 2018, (article mentioned in this newsletter). This Wednesday night study averages about 12-15 people and follows the Common Lectionary.

Our church is currently averaging from 80-120 persons in worship each Sunday. Due to the leave of absence of choir director, Kenny Graves, Brenda Duncan, and Adam McKinnis have been filling in. Kenny is presently back as director. Currently 6 liturgists serve on a rotating basis.

Mark Warrington reported that a new lapel microphone is needed for the worship service, with the cost being \$300-\$500. The committee recommends that the board approves this purchase.

Brother Drew Brewer announced that Lent will begin on Ash Wednesday, February 14<sup>th</sup> with a worship service. There will be special services during Holy Week, on Thursday, March 29<sup>th</sup> at 6:00 p.m. and also on Good Friday, March 30<sup>th</sup> at 3:00 p.m. Easter Sunday is April 1<sup>st</sup> with Sunrise Service at 6:00 a.m., breakfast at 7:00 a.m., and late worship at 10:30 a.m. Our next fifth Sunday is April 29<sup>th</sup>.

Cora Criss reported on the youth and children ministries. We currently have 15-17 young people on Wednesdays. Brother Drew will be leading them in a Baptism/Confirmation class for 7 weeks beginning February 7<sup>th</sup> through Lent.

The UMW and UMM continue to meet monthly. The women's group has 27 active members; the men's group has 25. Joyce and Larry McCutcheon continue to host a grief support group meeting each month in their home.

Our financial giving continues at a healthy pace. We paid 100 percent of our Apportionments in for 2017. Our special Christmas offering helped us with that. We will sponsor, along with the Outreach Committee, UMCOR Sunday on March 11<sup>th</sup>.

### **United Methodist Women**

The United Methodist Women met Monday, January 8, 2018, at 1:00 p.m. in the church library with 19 members present and Monday, February 12, 2018, at a new meeting time of 3:00 p.m. with 22 members present.

During the January meeting the group discussed what to do with the remaining money left from 2017. Suggestions were

made, voted on, and plans were approved to purchase an ice machine for the CLC and provide money for work on one of the church's restrooms.

President Cora Criss led the discussion about new service and/or outreach projects the group wanted to be a part of during 2018. Making another trip during April or May to the UMCOR facility in Decatur, Alabama was one suggestion upon which the group agreed. Other discussions involved helping with the local food bank and continuing to contribute to the Nashville Rescue Mission. Other possibilities mentioned were the Ronald McDonald House and Monroe Carell Children's Hospital. During the February meeting, Cora had researched each of the facilities' programs listed above. The group decided to set up a visit to the UMCOR facility tentatively set for April 10th and to participate in outreach programs at Monroe Carell. If anyone is interested in either of these projects, please see Cora.

Also, the group discussed plans for the Lewis County Nursing Home birthday celebration slated for March 28th. The group provides cake and ice cream for all nursing home residents and staff to celebrate all birthdays for the year. This is a fun and enriching event for all involved.

Guest speaker for the February meeting was Becky Carroll, Lewis County Senior Citizens Coordinator. Becky discussed available programs at this facility and how the UMW could help.

The UMW is having a garage sale Saturday, May 12<sup>th</sup> in the CLC to help raise funds for projects. Anyone in the church family interested in donating items for this sale, please ask any UMW member. We would like to have slightly used items but will not be selling clothing. We appreciate your help in gathering items for this event as well as items for the outreach project for

Monroe Carell. (This is described in a separate article.)

## **Getting to Know Church Family**



"Some people make the world a better place just by being in it." What a

wonderful quote by an anonymous person! This quote makes me think about a special person in our church family, Cheryl (Cheri) France. She is one of those unique individuals whose smile is contagious and her personality makes you feel comfortable around her during the first encounter. Cheri believes in living life to its fullest and treating others the way you would want to be treated. After getting to know Cheri, one finds that she will do anything she can to help others and to serve the First United Methodist Church of Hohenwald.

Cheri France was born in Dallas. Texas and was nine weeks old when she was adopted by Van and Darcie France, then moving at 9 months old to Spokane, Washington. This was to be one of many places Cheri would live in her life including the coastline of California from Stockton to Encino where her mom and dad ran a travel lodge. From there they moved to Redondo Beach, Mission Beach, and Pacific Beach in the San Diego area and then moved to Newport Beach. As a result. Cheri became a beach kid with a bay on one side and the beach on the other. Cheri's father, Van, was a man of many talents. Early in his life after graduating from college, he worked in industrial labor relations before being chosen to set up a training program for workers at Disneyland. He became the founder of Disney University, which quickly became the heart of Disney employee training. Cheri's mother was content at the time doing odd jobs and being a mother and housewife.

In 1959, when Cheri was fourteen, her mom decided she wanted to travel to see the Holy Land so they toured Europe seeing almost every country except Spain and the Scandinavian countries. Her favorite part of visiting Egypt was riding the camels out to see the Pyramids and visiting the Cario Museum. As they got off the bus in the Holy Land, Cheri was fascinated by seeing the people dressed as they did back in biblical days carrying bread on top of their heads. During her travels, she has also visited Tahiti, Japan, Baja, Mexico and has been numerous times to Hawaii. She had the opportunity to go to Israel again almost 50 years later in 2008.

Cheri had one brother, Ray, who was ten years older than she, but who perished in 1990, in a plane crash in Grants Pass, at the age of 55. He and a partner were trying to clean bugs from a Cessna they were flying for Civil Air Patrol when the plane ran out of gas. Both died doing what they loved the most. Later at the age of forty, Cheri found out she had a half sister who lived in Albuquerque, New Mexico.

In 1972, Cheri moved to Portland, Oregon where she met her husband who was a firefighter. They were married ten years. She lived in Portland forty years attending the Church of Christ Church and Beavorton FourSquare Church, a Pentecostal spirit-filled church.

In 2012, Cheri had become tired of hectic city life and sought the more serene, calm life of a rural area. Her cousin, Julene, suggested Tennessee so Cheri contacted another cousin, Lanette Williams, who lived in the Volunteer State. After one visit, Cheri became sold on the quaint town of Hohenwald. She moved shortly thereafter and has lived here ever since on Little Swan Creek Road with her 17 year old cat named Jazz.

Cheri says the most important accomplishment in her life has been

getting her father's book republished after fifteen years of being out of print. The book is titled Window on Main Street: Thirty-Five Years of Creating Happiness. Cheri grew up at Disneyland, every child's dream, and remembers walking down main street when it was still a dirt road. She had birthday parties there and worked a couple of summers as a main gate ticket seller. This, she decided, was not what she wanted to do with the rest of her life. Her various jobs over her life span have included working for the Orange County Heart Association, the City of Costa Mesa as a computer operator, working for Freightliner and various other places mainly working in accounts payable. Before moving to Hohenwald, Cheri was working at a property management company.

Cheri loves her church family and has served as secretary of the United Methodist Women since June of 2016. She is very efficient in this job and has also worked diligently at the UMW Bazaars as greeter, ticket seller and collector, and cashier each year.

Obviously, I never knew Cheri's dad, but after reading about him on the worldwide web, it is obvious that many of his traits and life philosophies became instilled in Cheri. He put a smile on the faces of the many visitors to Disneyland; "he believed that the best part of Disneyland was the people," according to author, Dave Koenig; and at one point in his life he was quoted as saying, "It's all in your attitude." Being around Cheri makes you smile and laugh and reminisce about old times. It is obvious that she loves people and loves to get to know others just like her dad. And Cheri has one of the most positive, upbeat attitudes, which makes whoever is with her comfortable and happy. I

look forward to getting to know her better, and I strongly encourage all of you to do the same.
