#### From the Pastor's Desk



Bible Verse: "There is no fear in love; but perfect love casts out fear...We love him because he first loved us." 1 John 4: 18a,19

"To be afraid is the basis of all things," suggested the writer, William Faulkner. The first lesson, of course, is to admit our fear and not let it control us. If fear is not going to change us into the evil we despise, we must find some resources in the darkness to help us. But dealing with those persons or things which threaten us seems to require a power capable of reaching our very deepest anxiety.

So, how <u>do</u> we deal with fear? "Love overcomes fear," says 1 John. Good advice in the light of day, but when the shadows close around, and loneliness takes over, it may sound like so much whistling in the dark.

Still, the Bible consistently teaches that in Jesus Christ there is an alternative to living in fear. The announcement itself

begins: "Be not afraid, for behold I bring you good news..." And, interestingly enough, this is the same word which greets those who first learn that Jesus has risen: "Be not afraid!" The message is clear that the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus addresses our deepest anxiety. But how?

"Why are you afraid?" This is the question Jesus asked his disciples one day when they were on a boat in a storm. It is also his question to us.

"Do you not care if we perish?" This was their fear shouting back.

Jesus understands our anxiety. He looks behind our fears to their source. Jesus knew there is a reality with the power to overcome our fear. It is the same truth which the writer of 1 John offered when he wrote that love has the power to overcome fear. In this dark and often dangerous world, we are in the company of a God who is love.

Is it like whistling in the dark? Maybe. Have you ever noticed how some people whistle when they are afraid? It relieves tension. But it also creates a tune which just may encourage someone else to join in —creating a feeling of *companionship*. And isn't that what we are really searching for in calming our fears? Companionship. A sense of community strong enough to

overcome our anxiety. The Christian reality expressed in Jesus Christ affirms that God, who is love, dwells with us. God has taken up residence with us and calls us to join with him in creating community.

Such love may be just what is able to overcome our fear. Where God's love finds expression, fear can be overcome. It is in such community that we can live from love and not from fear. Maybe in such a community we, too, can learn to whistle a tune like this:

"Twas grace that taught my heart to fear; and grace my fears relieved. How precious did that grace appear, the hour I first believed!"

As Mrs. Sue talked about her childhood, it became obvious that everything she has learned about life and living has been because of a strong family, which began with her parents. Her father was a hard working man who worked as a mechanic, lumberman, school bus driver, and innovator during his time on this earth. Mrs. Sue with pride told of her father running pipe from a natural spring to their house, allowing them to have running water in the house. She said he was very smart and industrious. Her mom, a dedicated wife and mother to four children. cooked, made their clothes, and worked alongside her husband to see that their family was well taken care of. The family started out in the Riverside Community of Lewis County where all four children were born, then moved to the Sinking Creek Community in Perry County. Later the family moved to Hohenwald, Tennessee.

Mrs. Sue married Jacob Springer
Marbet and had two children, Bill Marbet
who presently lives in Columbia, Tennessee
and Lynn Tate who lives in Lobelville,
Tennessee. Mr. Marbet passed away when
Lynn was three years old. In 1957, Mrs.
Sue married Dr. Roger Bouldin who was a
dentist in Hohenwald. She, like her mother
before her, was a house wife who put great
emphasis on the importance of family and
closeness. Her life has been enriched by

her children and her grandchildren, Dan and John McEwen and Lee and Jacob Marbet. She also has seven great-grandchildren. She beams when she talks about them all and says they have been her greatest accomplishment in her life. Living life to its fullest has always been her philosophy, and that fulfillment has been enhanced by her loving family.

During their years of marriage, the Bouldins traveled as many places as life allowed them time to travel. Mrs. Sue has been in 49 states and 23 countries. Her favorite state was Colorado because of the memorable panoramic views of the terrain, and her favorite country was Italy for the very same reason, its breathtaking beauty.
