

From the Pastor's Desk

"When they came to the place which is called Golgotha, they crucified Jesus there with the criminals, one on his right and one on his left. Then Jesus said, 'Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing.'" (Luke 23: 33-34)



Lloyd Douglas in *The Robe* tells about the time when Jesus meets Zacchaeus—the tax collector who comes out of the sycamore tree, and whose life is changed. Zacchaeus is a thief, but after meeting Jesus he declares to those whom he has cheated, "I will give back four times over everything I have stolen! I will give half of everything I possess to the poor!"

Lloyd Douglas pictures Jesus asking, "Zacchaeus, what led you to do that?" And Zacchaeus answered, "Master, when I looked in your eyes, I saw there mirrored the Zacchaeus I was intended to be."

At one and the same time, that is what fascinates us and frightens us in Jesus. We look at him and something in us says, "Yes, that's what I want to be." Then we look at ourselves and we say, "No, I can never be that!" That is the reason the words of forgiveness from the Cross are so important. They are expressions of the compassion, the sympathy, of Christ. You see, the Good News is that Jesus is not just our example, our teacher, but more than these things, he is our <u>Savior</u>. The keynote is compassion—not the compassion he calls us to, but the compassion he extends to us and then invites us to grow in.

Jesus can be the one who loves us, accepts us, forgives us, cleanses us, and at the same moment so flows **into** us that we are enabled to live more like him than we ever previously believed we could.

Quite frankly, I am sick to death of ideals. I have so many ideals and have been so frustrated by each of them that I really do not care anymore. What I am looking for is a Savior—not someone who will just tell me what I ought to be, but someone who will forgive me for what I already am. And then with his very love will enable me to be more than I ever believed I could be. It is exactly that which Jesus does on the Cross for all of us.

Karen Niedergeses, Executive Director of The Shelter, Inc. in Lawrenceburg, TN presented the March program. The UMW are asked each meeting to bring an item to donate to this worthy cause and also gives a monetary donation from the UMW budget each year. The Shelter, Inc. also serves Lewis County residents.

The group planned for the annual birthday party for The Lewis County Manor Nursing Home. This party, however, was cancelled because of illness at the facility. It has now been rescheduled for June 26, 2019, at 2:30 p.m. Members who would like to participate should be there by 2:00 p.m. The group treats residents to cake, ice cream, snacks,

and drinks. Money was also collected at the March meeting for Birthday Bucks.

Deanna Darden-Carroll, Child and Family
Advocate for the Davis House presented the
program at the April meeting. April is National
Child Abuse Awareness month. Deanna shared
with the group signs of child abuse, our
responsibility as citizens to report suspected child
abuse, and the severity of the problem by giving
some startling statistics. The Davis House is a nonprofit child and family advocacy center whose
purpose is to "combat child abuse by coordinating
services to children and their families in crisis and
providing community education focused on
prevention and early intervention."

The group discussed the Christmas Shoe Boxes and planning a possible trip to the UMCOR facility. Kathy Knight gave the devotion while Martha Edwards spoke on being "ambassadors for Christ," and how Easter presents a time for Christian rebirth.

Junior Senior Sunday School Class

The Junior-Senior High School class is now working through Max Lucado's book for high schoolers entitled: *God's Story Your Story – When His Story Becomes Your Story*. Each chapter is based on a topic citing what happens "When God's Story becomes yours ..." with the first chapter being: "Ordinary Matters." Then, chapter 2 is: "You Know Satan's Next Move." Then comes 3: "...When God's Story becomes Yours You Find Your True Home." Then comes chapter 4: "...You Hear a Voice You can Trust." Chapter 7 is: "...Power Moves In;" and we just finished chapter 8: "...The Right Doors Open." The coming chapters are: 9 "...All Things Work for Good;" 10 "...God will Come for You;" and 11 "...You Will Finally Graduate." Each of these various chapters explore the process by which we grow into full Christians and what is to be expected "when God's Story becomes our story."

Some subjects that we have also begun to focus on are the first books of the Old Testament, the Torah, and the first 4 books of the New Testament, the Gospels. It may well be that we shall attempt to award members of the class in some way if they memorize the books of the entire Bible in order.

Thanks for Giving



April 7th was UMCOR Sunday at the First United Methodist Church of Hohenwald. According to spokesperson, Cora Criss, \$1,506 was donated by the congregation through a special offering. This money is greatly appreciated by the United Methodist Committee on Relief to be used in helping families globally as they deal the loss and devastation incurred by catastrophic events such as tornadoes, hurricanes, fires, etc. Thanks to all who so graciously contributed.

Security in Church

Efforts to keep us secure while in church have been an on-going process for some time now. Whether it is escape planning in the event of fire, sheltering in place during weather events or other emergencies, the safety and security of our members is a priority. With that in mind we have added another layer of safety by installing an advanced camera system to monitor important areas in and around the church. It was decided that the entry doors to the church were our #1 concern. All entry doors to the church have a camera to monitor suspicious persons who might approach during our worship services. There will never be cameras inside the church looking at the congregation. There is a TV monitor in the sound booth that enables any operator to scan these doors for activity that might be suspicious. We presently have a total of 6 cameras around the facility, and all cameras are recording to a computer hard drive 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

In the event of a break in, we can review the recorded video for evidence. This information can be transferred to a thumb drive or a CD and given to the police to be used as evidence. All recorded video can be stored and reviewed for more than 30 days before it is automatically erased to free up space for more video. This whole system is upgradeable, and we still have room to add 2 more cameras when needed. This camera system was installed and has been operating for more than 8 months.






Do You Know the Emergency Safety Drills?

Diagrams were passed out to each member in the bulletin, and Cora, with the help of other church members pointed out where to go in the case of each of these situations. The diagrams are printed below, but if you would like to have a larger version, please see Cora. Members are encouraged to study over these diagrams so you will know what to do and where to go if bad weather or a fire occurs while you are in the building sanctuary. Knowing what to do is important to your safety as well as the safety of others around you.



Thanks for the Memories



In his novel Look Homeward, Angel, author Thomas Wolfe said, "You can never go home again." People may think this is not true because they return all the time to where they grew up and where their families still live. Some have lived there all their lives. However, in examining the greater meaning the statement is so very true and relevant to everyone's lives. When you do go home, you find that things have vastly changed, including the person that you have become. The journey along the way has changed you, matured you, and made you stronger. Even the physical existence of the town has changed and transformed into something else, maybe even something unrecognizable. But it is still home.

On the day that I met Brother Drew for lunch for this interview, I asked him if he was excited about his retirement. He smiled shyly and said that it was "bittersweet," meaning that as an old chapter of the life he had grown accustomed to for the last 13 years was about to come to a close, leaving behind a congregation he has grown very fond of, was sad for him. However, starting a new phase in his life in the familiar surroundings of Jackson, Tennessee and going back to his roots and family made him very happy. He would be spending more time with his daughter and son-in-law and precious grandson Abram in the house that held so many memories for him, his mother's

house, where the foundation for the early part of his life began.

Drew Brewer was born to parents Allen Sidney Brewer and Betty Wells Brewer on June 5, 1950, in Jackson, Tennessee. He has two siblings both brothers, Jim and Mike Brewer. When Drew was five years old, his dad, who worked at the University of Tennessee at Knoxville, passed away unexpectedly, leaving his mother to raise three boys on her own. The youngest was less than a year old. Mrs. Brewer got her Certified Nurse Anesthetist degree and was able to send all three sons through college, which says a great deal about her determination to make life as normal as possible for her sons and to see to it that they had every opportunity to do well in life.

As a youth, Drew grew up attending the old Hays Avenue Methodist Church in Jackson, which over time became Aldersgate United Methodist Church. He was very active citing two of his favorite activities being singing in the choir and being active in the Methodist Youth Fellowship group. The men at the church were very kind and generous toward the three Brewer boys. He referred to their kindness as that they "adopted them." Drew remembers many times that individuals in the group would give them money to go out and eat or for other things they might otherwise need. One man, named Mr. Adron McAlexander told Drew, "Since your dad died, the men of this church have been looking out for you boys." "I prayed you would end up a minister." Drew attended Southern Methodist in Dallas and Lambuth College in Jackson where he received an undergraduate degree. Later he went to Memphis Theological School where he would be ordained in 1986. Drew said that Mr. McAlexander would be so very proud of him and the fact that he has served the Lord for 35 years.

During his early years, Drew had many interests. He sang professionally in a soft rock band in the early 70s on into the 80s for 15 years. He had several jobs including being a high school English teacher for five years and served also as president

of the Poetry Society from 1974 to 1980. During his life he has lived many places including Jackson, Memphis, Henning, and Hohenwald, all in Tennessee, Fulton, Kentucky, and San Francisco, California. He became ordained as a Methodist minister in 1986. He was married to Elaine Blanchard Brewer for 20 years, and they had one daughter Jennifer. Jennifer and her husband Dalton Kilburn have one son Abram and live in Jackson. It is obvious that Drew is looking forward to spending more time watching his grandson grow up and teaching him to love many of the same things he has grown to love so much.

As a former English teacher, it is no surprise that Drew is a voracious reader. Other interests include sports, mainly football and baseball. He is a huge fan of the Los Angeles Dodgers and the Green Bay Packers. In the early part of his life he spent a lot of time fishing and camping. His favorite Tennessee campground from years ago was the Fall Creek Falls State Park, but he states that it has changed so much and become very crowded and commercialized, taking away its appeal. He has been camping in 23 National Parks and loves the Smoky Mountains. Upon retirement, he plans to get back into Lifemaster Dupicate Bridge. Playing bridge with others is something he use to really enjoy and feels that it would be a fun activity again and would help him meet new people. Presently he is remodeling his mother's home, a home built in 1922 by his grandfather, which is where he will be moving in June.

Drew is drawn to people who are authentic and is impressed by the traits of humility and hospitality in individuals he has met over time. Those are the traits that encouraged him to accept his appointment to the First United Methodist Church of Hohenwald, where he has spent 13 years—learning the town, its people, and enjoying the culture and beauty of Lewis County. He is very grateful that God led him to UMC of Hohenwald, and it has been a pleasure to serve here. He will always treasure the many friendships that he has

made and feels like he has made important contributions to the church and its congregation. Spending his last years here have been the best memories he could have ever hoped for.

During the interview, I asked Brother Drew his favorite childhood memory. He said that when he was three years old, his father took him to the Memphis Zoo. As families do, he and his dad posed at one of those photo booths often found at vacation spots. He remembers sitting on his dad's shoulders as children love to do; it was the only picture he was to have of him and his father. He kept it in his wallet until his wallet was stolen, along with the picture. Even though someone took away that tangible evidence of father and son bonding, Drew would forever have its memory etched into his mind. He feels like it metaphorically speaks to him as representing the many adult shoulders that would support him over the years through the many tough times. God's shoulders have been the broadest and most sturdy through both good and bad times. He is looking forward to a new chapter in his life and hopes that anyone visiting the West Tennessee Jackson area will come by for a visit. You will be most welcome.

On behalf of the First United Methodist Church of Hohenwald, we wish you (Brother Drew) a life filled with love and happiness. Enjoy time with your family, make new friends, but never forget that you have many friends in Hohenwald who will never forget you. We appreciate your years of service, hard work, and dedication to the church. You will be greatly missed.
