

On Saturday the 15th, the children were treated to a bounce house, water




slide, a cookout, and an ice cream social to finish out a memorable occasion.

Junior-Senior Sunday School Class

The Junior-Senior High Sunday School Class has completed the work on the Max Lucado study entitled: *God's Story/Your Story.* We even worked through most of the review section at the end discussing the questions Rev. Lucado put to the reader after reading all main the portions.

We are currently studying the various sections of the Bible learning the names of specific sections. The first 5 books of the *Bible* are, for example, the "*Torah*." These books are the oldest books of the Old Testament and are still the basis of the Jewish religion. The latter portions of the Old Testament are the books of the minor prophets. The first 4 books of the New Testament are the Gospels, Matthew, Mark, Luke and John, and the first three of these gospels are known as the synoptic gospels because they all treat the same subject matter in much the same way, namely: the life, ministry, crucifixion, death and resurrection of Christ Jesus.

We are now also attempting to memorize in order the titles of the books of the New Testament, for they represent Jesus' promised New Covenant. This will be very helpful to the class whenever they find themselves wanting to search for specific New Testament books that are the subject of devotionals or passages they want to memorize. We have practiced looking up various books as an exercise in finding unusual names and titles. The classroom is equipped with enough copies to allow each class member to look at same Bible.


Everybody that lives around us says tear that Lighthouse down. The big ships they don't sail this way anymore.

Getting to Know Church Family



We've all heard the clichés "in every life a little rain must fall," or "when life gives vou lemons, make lemonade." The person interviewed for this issue of Sharing has experienced many obstacles in her life but has always made the very best of everything that life has given to her. Evangelist Billy Graham once said, "A keen sense of humor helps us to overlook the unbecoming, understand the unconventional, tolerate the unpleasant, overcome the unexpected, and outlast the unbearable." Donna Hood has certainly done all of these things and more. She brightens any room she walks into with her keen sense of humor and her contagious smile. My first encounter with this humor was at a yard sale, sponsored by the United Methodist Women, a dreary, rainy, stormy day, which yielded very few customers but lots of bonding and humor among this special group of ladies. The high point of this day was exploring the countless unusual items people had donated to our cause. As Donna sauntered around, looking through the items we had for sale, she found a mask of Frankenstein, which she quickly put on.



Her small body with the enormous monster head made us all hold our stomachs with laughter. It was at this time that I knew that I needed to get to know this lady better.

Donna Sue Killingsworth was born to Fanny Mae Woodlee Killingsworth and Glen Austin Killingsworth, who was a butcher, on October 24, 1948, in Nashville, Tennessee. She attended Eakin Elementary School, Cavert Junior High School and West End High School. Donna's childhood dream was to be a cowboy. She loved to camp and fish and had many adventures with her brother who was her best friend. Some adventures she fondly remembers were selling pork skins at the flea markets on 3rd Street in Memphis, selling Christmas trees, and taking pictures at the indoor flea markets. She loved taking Spanish lessons and playing the harmonica, which made Donna a "colorful" young lady.

In 1964, she married Jerry Hood, and they were married for eighteen and a half years. They had four children; oldest Phyllis Dancy, then Laura Robinson, followed by Sharon Butler and one son, Jeff Hood. Much of this time she spent as a single mom. She has lived in Mt. Juliet, Tennessee; El Paso, Texas; Houston, Texas; South Haven, Mississippi; and Memphis, Tennessee. After moving to Memphis in 1977, she worked at entry level for Audiotronics and worked her way up to plant manager. She worked there for eighteen years. Then she was hired by Aluma Form as a customer service representative and worked there for twelve years. Donna moved to Hohenwald,

Tennessee in 2010, and loves the small town because it was easy to make new friends and settle down to a slower lifestyle.

With four children, thirteen grandchildren, and fourteen greatgrandchildren, she laughingly says her favorite time of the year is Christmas because she likes to kid her family about not being able to remember their names for gifts and assigning them a number. I can assure you that Donna knows each of them well and loves them as much as life itself, as she mentioned that family meant the world to her. She is a kidder as many of the grandchildren have found out. She once told a granddaughter that she was a werewolf, and that she came from a family of werewolves. The child was intrigued and went to school and bragged to her teacher about her notorious grandmother, which quickly prompted a call home. Donna always finds time for humor.

In 1988, Donna founded GF Designs, she lovingly calls Granny's Fanny Designs. Via this internet site, she offered many items, much like a flea market. She has always loved graphic art and offered silk screening using the program Print Master. When asked if she was an artist, she said that from youth, she could mimic most pictures and graphics, which led to an interest in graphic design. On this Internet site, she also offered primitive art itemslittle figurines of people made of mud from the Mississippi River. You will see a picture of one of these unique creations below, along with other items Donna has created. Donna made and painted these herself.

Her brother Bill got Donna involved in the Writer's Group, which met at the old Coffee House in Hohenwald. It was here that she honed her skill for writing. He also got her involved in the Buffalo River Theatrical Group which met at the Commodore Hotel in Linden, Tennessee. She frequently designed flyers for this group and served as vice president at one time.

As time went by, Donna continued to pursue on her own her love for writing. She has had a poem which won an Editor's Choice Award, has written a book and had it published, has written a children's book, complete with graphic art designs, and continues to work on two other books and short stories. The published book is titled 24 Blair *Boulevard*, the children's book is titled *My* Brother's Chicken, and one of the two books she is presently working on is about an asylum. I recently had the experience of reading her published book. It contains well developed characters, an intriguing plot with a catchy twist in the end, and flowing dialogue. The cover proudly carries the name of the author D.S. Hood.


When moving to Hohenwald in 2010, Donna, like many who move to a new town, sought out a home church. The first Sunday she visited the Methodist Church, she said everyone was warm and welcoming. She laughingly says that the following Sunday she attended again, but no one said a word to her. As she went to her car after the service, having doubts that this was the church for her, she said a lady came toward her and said that she was so glad to see her again at church and welcomed her. It was Wanda Creasy. Donna has been a faithful attendee ever since.

In 2013, Donna suffered a heart attack, a scary time in her life. The night it occurred, she drove herself to her brother's house and had him call for an ambulance, because she was concerned about her dog, Frodo. She describes her experience as a near death one, hearing her son begging her not to leave as she fought for her life. Recovery was slow, but she quickly found out that it was not God's time for her, and today she continues to touch the lives of each person she encounters.

During her spare time, Donna continues to write and enjoys playing "Fantasy Football." She calls her team "Fat Fannies." She loves her new little dog Silver. And she finds honesty and humor essential to one's existence and says that to be truthful and hard-working, and to to find time for humor in one's life are as breathing is to living. If you don't know Donna well, take time to get to know this unique lady; it will be well worth your time. This is a lady who appreciates finding humor in everyday things and occurrences. As author and speaker Anne Wilson Schaef once said, "When we lose our sense of humor, we lose our perspective on life." Donna Hood epitomizes strength and resilience and lives life appreciating each day and the humor within.
