Sukkot, the feast of booths

When the Israelites finally settled in the Promised Land, God wanted Israel to observe this festival by living in temporary shelters for seven days as a reminder that when their ancestors were crossing a wilderness, God provided them booths to dwell in.

We have reached the first anniversary of the storms that devastated a swath of our state from the TN River, just north of us, all the way across to the Cumberland Plateau around Cookeville. Nashville was hit very hard. Now I am beginning to see stories in

the news about rebuilding efforts; seriously hampered by the pandemic, businesses are now being allowed to reopen their doors. Vaccines are flooding into clinics and hospitals quicker than expected as well, hastening the rate at which some measure of normal life may return in the foreseeable future. We might be coming out of the wilderness soon. But probably not as soon, or as fully as we'd like to.

A year ago, we thought the virus would be a short-lived nuisance to church life. We were going to close a couple of weeks to "flatten the curve" and then things would be better. Weeks became months, attendance and giving both plummeted, meetings were postponed, ministries curtailed. As we held our breath & waited, a whole year slipped by. We can't let another one be eaten up in "maybe next week, or month." We need to get things going. And we may need to...


